COULD: USES

(Modal Verb)

PAST SIMPLE

Used to talk about what someone or something was able or allowed to do:

- She walked off before I could say anything.
- I could never have achieved this without the encouragement of my husband and family.
- I could see by the look on their faces that something was wrong.
- I wish I could find (the) time to do more reading.
- Even when you win a match you always feel you could have played better.

PERMISSION

Used as a more polite form of "can" when asking for permission:

- Could I borrow your pen?
- Could we see her now, please?
- Could I have some more pudding?
- Could I use your bathroom, please?
- Could I leave the children with you this morning?

REQUEST

Used as a more polite form of "can" when asking someone to provide something or do something:

- Please could you explain why you're so late.
- I'm frozen could you close the window?
- I've got rather a full week next week could we postpone our meeting?
- If you could get that report finished by Thursday I'd be very grateful.
- Ben, could you hand round the biscuits?

POSSIBILITY

Used to express possibility, especially slight or uncertainpossibility:

A lot of crime could be prevented.



- She could arrive anytime now.
- This new drug could be an important step in the fight against cancer.
- Be careful with that stick you could have hit your sister!

SUGGESTION

Used for making a suggestion:

- You could offer to buy her a new one.
- Could you get a bigger house?
- We could try mending it with glue.
- I could look after Toby for you.
- We could have lunch one day.

ASK PERMISSION (Present Tense)

Used as a more polite form of can when asking for permission:

Could I speak to Mr. Harley, please?

COULD: FORM

AFFIRMATIVE FORM:

Could comes first in the verb phrase (after the subject and before another verb):

We could have lunch early.

Could cannot be used with another modal verb:

- We could drive to France
 - Not: We could might drive to France. or We might could drive to France.

NEGATIVE FORM

The negative form of could is couldn't. We don't use don't/doesn't/didn't with could:

- He couldn't lift that. It's too heavy.
 - Not: He didn't could lift that ...



We can use the full form *could not* in formal contexts or when we want to emphasise something:

• Fabio was frightened. He could not move his arm. It was stuck.

QUESTION FORM

The subject and *could* change position to form questions. We don't use *do/does/did*:

- Could I pay by credit card?
 - Not: Do I could pay by credit card?

We use could and couldn't in question tags:

I could come back tomorrow, couldn't I?
